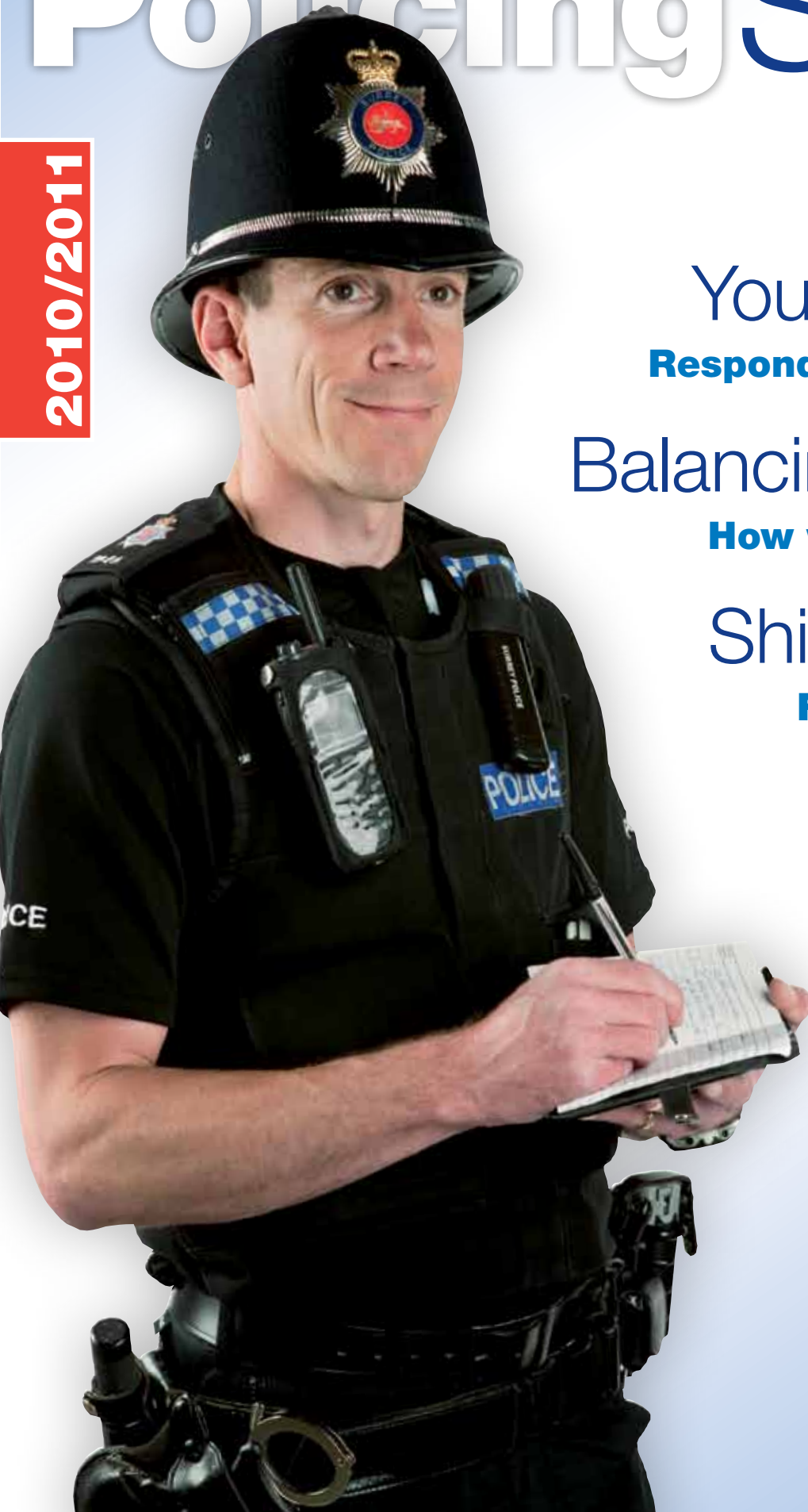

Welcome to *Policing Surrey*, the annual report that looks back at our performance during the past financial year and outlines our plans for the current one.

We are pleased to say that despite the challenging times affecting everyone in the country, we continue to meet targets in regards to crime reduction and public safety. You can see the full performance chart on page 7 or at [www.surreypa.gov.uk](http://www.surreypa.gov.uk).

We are on course to fulfil our aim to increase police officer numbers by recruiting 200 additional police constables by 2012. The recruitment drive is well underway and with almost 100 officers added in the last year, we are confident we will meet our target.

To achieve this we have reduced the number of senior leaders and are reviewing old and under-used police buildings. Our re-location plans for neighbourhood officers are unfolding throughout the county, with teams sharing offices with council colleagues and moving to new alternative bases in communities. Also listed below are ways to access our many services. Rest assured these plans and changes do not affect emergency response teams. They continue to operate as normal and we remain dedicated to maintaining Surrey's reputation as one of the safest counties in the country.

Looking ahead, we are preparing to play our part in the policing of the London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games. The Olympic Cycling Road Race will pass through five of Surrey's boroughs, the Olympic Cycling Time Trial will pass through Elmbridge, and Egham will play host to the world's finest rowing and canoeing teams for the duration of their competition.

We are working alongside Surrey County Council and the London Organising Committee of the Olympic and Paralympic Games (LOCOG) to ensure things run smoothly, safely and enjoyably.

## **ALBURY**

Last December an Albury resident received a three-year prison sentence for burglary and handling stolen goods. Detectives seized items from his home address including computer equipment, a mobile phone, and a chainsaw. Then in conjunction with Guildford Borough Council's Housing Team we issued this individual and his partner with an order which, in exceptional circumstances, puts a home owner/tenant at risk of eviction.

## **ASH WHARF**

Response officers acted quickly when £500 worth of property was reported missing from St Peter's Church in Ash Wharf in December. Within hours of the theft three men found themselves under arrest.

## **SEALE**

When an eagle-eyed Seale resident reported seeing some suspicious bags abandoned, the Safer Neighbourhood Team linked the information with a report of tools and clothing stolen from a car in the area. On investigating the find, officers recovered most of the missing property. The team also had successes in recovering stolen plant machinery in Hampshire and a number of stolen golf buggy batteries.

## **EAST HORSLEY**

Following complaints about the anti-social driving of a 'rogue driver' from East Horsley, we stopped him for driving offences no less than three times in six months. This led to his appearance at Guildford Magistrates' Court where he found himself facing fines and costs totalling £698. The Magistrate also imposed a six-month driving ban to reflect the man's serious disregard for the law and for the safety of other road users.

## **GUILDFORD**

A bumper Day of Action involving 20 officers and other police staff on Saturday 18 December brought about a marked decrease in thefts reported by town centre retailers. This year continues to see local officer activity in support of the town's thriving daytime and night-time economies. They deal swiftly with offences through a variety of means ranging from intervention clinics to arrests and subsequent court appearances.

## **NORMANDY**

Last year Guildford Road, Normandy was designated a Casualty Reduction Route in an effort to allay public concern and reduce the number of accidents with people injured occurring on that particular stretch. During the year, 244 drivers found themselves stopped and warned for speeding. Three offenders received a Fixed Penalty Notice for excess speed. Officers made 11 summonses to court for speeding in excess of 50mph and issued 20 fixed penalties for other road offences. Following this campaign, statistics showed the number of accidents resulting in injuries along Guildford Road had greatly reduced in 2010.

## **WEST CLANDON**

Two cold callers from Ramsgate found themselves frozen out when we received complaints about their activities in West Clandon. On investigation we found them selling low-value items door-to-door without the required certificate. They were doing so despite previous warnings about this requirement. They were, however, carrying false documentation which purported to give them official authority. Guildford Magistrates' Court convicted and fined both for selling goods door-to-door without a valid certificate.



## Driving home the safety message with our **Drive SMART** campaign

The partnership Drive SMART campaign to tackle anti-social driving and increase road safety contributed to 80 fewer people being killed or seriously injured on Surrey's roads in its first year.

Surrey Police and Surrey County Council originally launched Drive SMART in September 2009 as a year-long campaign but it has been

extended for a further year after figures for 2009-2010 confirmed the initiative helped save lives on the county's roads.

Nine fewer children were killed or seriously injured and there were 86 fewer crashes on Surrey's roads during the year, compared to 2008-2009.

The campaign seeks to educate motorists – and

where necessary carry out enforcement – around a range of anti-social driving and road safety issues including speeding, using a mobile phone while driving, drink and drug driving and motorcycle safety.

## How we're hitting hard at the organised crime gangs

Disrupting criminal gangs and keeping serious crime in Surrey low are top concerns for Surrey residents and top priorities for the Force.

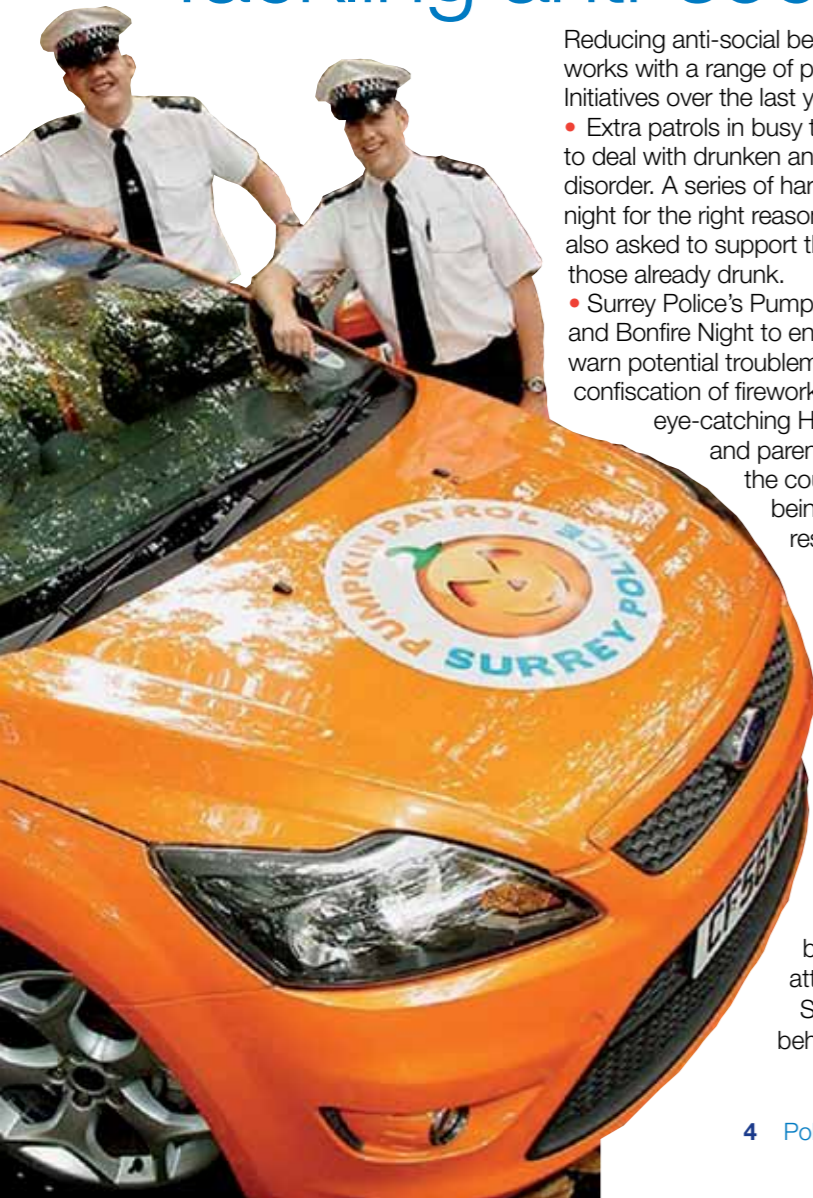
This year, teams across the county including our Serious Crime Investigation Team and Cross Border Investigation Team have worked hard to solve dozens of crimes and ensure the Force's target to dismantle 15 organised criminal gangs was achieved.

- A gang which had been producing cannabis on an industrial scale was sentenced to a total of just over 15 years in prison in September. Surrey Police officers gathered intelligence to trace the gang's production to a large warehouse in Cambridgeshire.
- Surrey Police has also been hitting criminals where it hurts – in their pockets. A convicted burglary gang boss had £100,000 worth of assets recovered after investigators proved it was from the proceeds of his crime. The 37-year-old man directed a gang whose members would break into homes at night and steal key fobs for cars parked in victims' driveways.

# WORKING TOGETHER

## Tackling anti-social behaviour



Reducing anti-social behaviour is a priority for Surrey Police and the Force works with a range of partner agencies to address the issue. Initiatives over the last year have included:

- Extra patrols in busy town centres over the Christmas and New Year periods to deal with drunken and rowdy behaviour and reduce violence and public disorder. A series of hard-hitting posters reminded revellers to remember their night for the right reasons and enjoy themselves responsibly. Businesses were also asked to support the campaign by not serving alcohol to under-18s or those already drunk.
- Surrey Police's Pumpkin Patrols took to the streets over Halloween and Bonfire Night to ensure people had a safe and enjoyable time and to warn potential troublemakers they faced on the spot fines, arrest and the confiscation of fireworks. Officers visited locations across the county in the eye-catching Halloween-themed patrol car to speak with youngsters and parents. Working with Trading Standards, 28 shops across the county were visited to test whether underage children were being sold fireworks. None of the retailers visited sold age-restricted goods without checking proper identification.

## Terrorism: don't take any chances

No call is a waste of time – if you suspect it, report it – that is the key message to help everyone prevent terrorism.

While Surrey is recognised as being a comparatively safe place and there is no specific threat to the county, the UK faces a significant threat and our close proximity to London and transport centres means there is a real possibility that premises in Surrey could be used by terrorists planning and preparing an attack.

Surrey's communities are best placed to notice behaviour which is out of place in normal day-to-

day living and could be the tell-tale signs of terrorist activity. This could include anyone who for no obvious reason:

- Buys or stores large amounts of chemicals, fertilisers or gas cylinders
- Behaves differently or suspiciously
- Has a large number of mobile phones for no obvious reason
- Has passports or other documents in different names
- Travels for long periods of time but is vague about where they're going
- Takes an interest in security measures like CCTV

## Help us to beat the burglar

Burglaries in areas of Surrey dropped dramatically following the use of forensic property marking kits by Surrey householders as part of the Force's Beat the Burglar campaign.

In some areas burglaries from homes fell by an average of 66% in the six months following the launch of the property marking initiative, with incidents down 58% when compared with the same time period the previous year.

Surrey Police teamed up with SelectaDNA for the campaign, a company which offers uniquely coded, non-toxic liquid allowing homeowners to 'forensically mark' valuable possessions including laptops, games consoles, jewellery and tools.

Barely visible to the naked eye and almost impossible to remove, the solution glows under ultraviolet (UV) light making it easy for police to detect and return property to the rightful owner if stolen.

Launched in Spring last year, the campaign offered residents discounted property marking kits along with general home safety and crime reduction advice.

The initiative also aimed to raise awareness among offenders of the risks associated with stealing forensically marked property. It highlighted how all frontline Surrey Police officers now carry UV torches and are actively looking for forensic marking on stolen property.

# HOW WE WORK FOR YOU...

From our current **£213.2m** annual budget, **£192.7m** is spent on our officers and staff.

The teams most visible to communities are the Safer Neighbourhood Teams, but they are supported by **hundreds of other officers and staff** who all have an important part to play in keeping you and your area safe.

## Here is a breakdown of how our staff are employed across the Force.

**Investigation (30%):** Teams responsible for investigating and detecting crime and prosecuting offenders. This includes CID, teams dealing with major crimes such as rape and murder, fraud, cross border crime, organised groups and drug dealers. This also includes officers and staff liaising with the Crown Prosecution Service, working in forensics and the Force's custody centres, and the teams dealing with the most dangerous and predatory offenders and protecting the most vulnerable victims.

**Neighbourhoods (15%):** Officers and staff responsible for neighbourhood policing, working with communities and partner organisations to tackle neighbourhood issues. This includes Safer Neighbourhood Teams, special constables and specialists focusing on casualty and crime reduction, licensing and young people. This also includes teams dealing with prolific and priority offenders, anti-social behaviour and drug and alcohol issues.

**Response (29%):** Officers and staff involved in responding to emergency calls 24-hours a day. This includes targeted response teams, roads policing, firearms, helicopter, search, police dogs, specialist operations and conflict management, the Force Control Room and call centre and front counter staff.

**Tasking and Co-ordination (10%):** Officers and staff involved in handling and analysing intelligence, Special Branch and counter terrorism operations, surveillance, planning for operations and emergencies and customer service.

**Support Services (16%):** Support staff including human resources, finance, information technology and strategic support and governance.

Surrey Police Authority is the independent body responsible for ensuring that Surrey has an efficient and effective police force that works in the best interests of local people.

The Authority has 17 members; nine County Councillors and eight Independent Members recruited from the general public. They are supported by a small team of staff based in Guildford.

## The Authority's responsibilities are:

- Consulting with local residents about their priorities for policing
- Setting the Force's direction and appointing Chief Officers
- Scrutinising the Force's performance
- Setting the budget and getting value for money

## ... And what Surrey Police aims to achieve in 2011/12

- Ensure that at least **80%** of the public in Surrey have confidence in the police in their neighbourhood
  - Ensure that at least **76%** of victims of anti-social behaviour are satisfied with the overall service provided by Surrey Police
  - Ensure that at least **79%** of victims of serious incidents are satisfied with the overall service provided by the police
  - Keep serious acquisitive crime (burglary, theft of and from motor vehicles, robbery/mugging) and serious violent crimes low – at or below **13.6** incidents per 1,000 population
  - Dismantle or disrupt **15** organised criminal groups
  - Charge or caution **450** people for supplying Class A and Class B drugs
  - Resolve **18.6%** of serious acquisitive crime, serious violent crime and rape and sexual abuse with a sanction detection\* or other police resolution
  - Save money in other areas to pay for more police constables – reaching **1,545** constables (from the 2010 baseline of 1,345)
  - Make the most of our resources by ensuring that at least **90%** of our officers and staff are available to deliver and support policing in Surrey
- \* Sanction detection can include a charge or summons, caution or when someone admits to other offences and asks for these to be 'taken into consideration'.

## DO SOMETHING SPECIAL

If you are over 18, fit, of good character and interested in part-time policing – why not apply to the Surrey Special Constabulary?

Special Constables are given a thorough grounding in police work, hold the same powers as their regular colleagues and wear the same uniform.

Forming a vital link between the regular police and the community, Specials perform numerous important policing tasks. You may find yourself working alongside Safer Neighbourhood Teams, conducting patrols to tackle anti-social behaviour, working within the response policing teams or assisting with investigations. You could provide security at major events, present evidence in court or assist at scenes of accidents, fights or fires.

Special Tracy Doughty says:

"I volunteer between 20-25 hours a month as a Special Constable and I never know what each new shift will bring. Since joining in 2008 I've been involved in many aspects of the job and have had an excellent insight into the world of policing.

"I've recently become a Special Sergeant and hope eventually to fulfil my ambition to be a full time Surrey Police officer. I'm so glad I volunteered. It's a truly exciting challenge and completely different from anything else I've done. I'd recommend it to anyone."
